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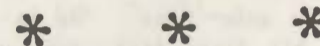
From the Editor's desk

THE SWINNERTON FAMILY

Most of the Swinnertons known today are descended from one of these three men :

1. WILLIAM SWINNERTON of BETLEY, Co.Staffs. 1740-1809
2. WILLIAM SWINNERTON of ADBASTON, Co.Staffs. 1757-1828
3. THOMAS SWINNERTON of FILLONGLEY, Co.Warks.
c.1710-1760

1. WILLIAM SWINNERTON of BETLEY has a clear descent from the Swinnertons of Whitmore and thus the Swinnertons of Swynnerton (vide Collections for a History of Staffs. Vol.VII Pt.II).

2. WILLIAM SWINNERTON of ADBASTON's origins are, as yet, unknown but his 3rd son, JOHN SWINNERTON (1787-1857) married Sarah Harding the daughter of William Harding and ELIZABETH SWINNERTON who has a clear descent from the Swinnertons of Yew Tree (Whitmore) and thus the Swinnertons of Swynnerton (vide S.H.C.Vol.VII Pt.II above).

(William of Betley and Elizabeth of Yew Tree were 7th cousins once removed).

3. Nothing previously was known of THOMAS SWINNERTON of FILLONGLEY's antecedents and there was no known connection between him or his descendants and William of Betley or William of Adbaston. However, the following extract from a letter from our member Ken Armistead throws a whole new light on the matter and I think he has made a very convincing case.

"Now I think I have found THOMAS. You may remember that I said I was struck with the regular occurrence of the Yew Tree christian names in the Warwickshire branch and wondered what happened to the various Yew Tree members who are simply named in the tree (SHC.Vol. VII p.162-164) with no details. I have been going through Alan Treherne's letter* and find that JOHN, son of EDWARD OF Yew Tree and Sarah bapt.6 Jan 1663/4, had by his second wife a son THOMAS bap.4 Aug.1709 at Newcastle under Lyme. He is the right age but what is telling is that his first three sons were called JOHN, THOMAS and JOSEPH, the names of his father and two uncles. How, we may ask, did he get to Fillongley? Well, he was only three years old when his father died and I think it very likely that his mother, who was his father's second wife and so possibly younger than he, would have married again and brought up Thomas in his stepfather's family. What I would like to find now is the marriage of an ELIZABETH Swinnerton after 1712 which would give the name of her second husband. We could then look for them in the Fillongley area and if we found them there it would clinch the matter."

* The letter from Mr.Treherne referred to is packed full of new information and was in response to a letter which I wrote following a newspaper cutting saying that he was interested in the clock and watch-making industry of Newcastle. I hope to publish this in a future issue.

SWINNERTONS OF BETLEY (6)

I have numbered this (6) as although we have not previously numbered the chapters relating to this branch as we have the others of Warwickshire and Adbaston, it is now building up into a coherent story and so it will make it easier for future reference.

In the Rev.Charles' books which I mentioned in our last issue I have found the answer to several questions which have been puzzling us for some time. In particular, he gives the following which not only establishes the birth of Thomas, the gamekeeper (TS.26) and proves, as I had always surmised, that he was the son of William (WS.14) and Margaret but also adds some previously unknown children to the tree.

Note : These notes are an insertion on a loose sheet of paper and are not in the Rev.Charles's writing. Unfortunately, it is undated but the insertions are initialled (C.S.)Rev.

The Rev.Charles, of course, concentrated on this branch as it was his own family. This now ties our South African member **Mr.TOM SWINNERTON** firmly in to the Betley Branch but also opens up several more avenues for research - for example, what happened to Jesse's descendants.

The mystery man is **Thomas** mentioned as being born in 1794 and marrying twice. Who was he ?

A careful check of the original registers of Adbaston has revealed some errors in the original transcription which was done by the then incumbent many years ago. The first is for 1826 when, in fact, the Register reads:

1826 April 15 Margaret Swinnerton, wife of George Swinnerton
of Shebden, aged 44. Buried

The other is :

1846 July 30 George Swinnerton of Shebden aged 61 Buried

This means that what I had assumed were errors in the Register were errors in copying.

We know that GEORGE had more children. Mrs. Litton, searching the High Offley register for her own Ethell family, found the following :

So - George did marry again and did have a son GEORGE (by his first wife) as I surmised. I must assume there fore that the MARGARET born in 1833 to GEORGE and MARGARET (nee Sheldon) was George Senior's granddaughter even though her father would only have been 16 at the time.

George Senior's second wife died in 1854 as we see from the Adbaston Register :

1854 Oct.29 Exeoner (sic) Swinnerton of Garmellow,
Eccleshall, aged 79 Buried

Two other errors have come to light from the same transcript - CHARLES (SFH.3 p.14) was buried in 1839 not 1836 and Elizabeth, his wife, in 1837.

It appears that a good part of the Adbaston family had now transferred their allegiance to High Offley church. Shebden is a small hamlet roughly half way between the two (High Offley is the next parish to Adbaston going SE.) and the register shows a number of Swinnerton entries from now on including the families of several of old **WILLIAM of Adbaston's** other sons - **THOMAS, FRANCIS** and **JOHN**.

However, for the moment we are only concerned with the family of **GEORGE**. His grandson **FRANCIS** next appears in the records when we see in the High Offley register:

1832 Aug.13 Francis Swinnerton otp (of this parish), Bach.
and Jane Timmis otp. Sp. by Banns. Married

The witness to the marriage is again **DANIEL SWINNERTON**. The next thing we see is the baptism of two children :

1836 July 27 Mary Ann, dau. Francis & Jane Swinnerton
of Shebden, Blacksmith
1840 Jan. 9 Emma " " "

Our extracts from the register stop here but General Registration commenced on the 1st July 1837 and from a certificate in my possession we know that **Francis** and **Jane** also had a son, another **FRANCIS** who was born on 7th April 1845. This was the founder of the catering firm with which I hope to deal in a future chapter.

There were also other children. On a gravestone in Adbaston churchyard can be seen :

In memory of **BETSEY Swinnerton** born 17 Mar.1850. Died Oct.22 1859
Also of **EDWIN Swinnerton**, son of **FRANCIS & JANE Swinnerton** of
Shebden, b. Oct.9 1834. D. Dec.12 1863

and on another headstone we find :

In memory of **FRANCIS SWINNERTON** of Shebden who died 14 Dec.1867
aged 58 / also **JANE**, wife of **FRANCIS SWINNERTON** who died 22 Feb.
1881 aged 67.

Notice how they all returned to their home parish to be buried.

DANIEL is a totally new figure, the only one so far is in the Betley family - perhaps this indicates a link between the two branches,

To bring the tree down to the present day it was only necessary to work through the records at St.Catherine's House, London. The present representatives of this branch are our members **Mr.H.J.Swinnerton** and **Mrs. J.G. Wade**. However, there are still many gaps and many questions to be answered. There are several names on the tree where we only have a record of their baptism and have no idea what subsequently became of them. In the case of **HENRY, PRISCILLA** and **ELIZA** we do not even have a record of their baptism, we only know that they existed because they are mentioned in their mother's will. Much research remains to be done.

II Sir John Savage of Clifton, knight, 6 Hen.V son and heir of John, married Maude, daughter and heir of Sir Robert Swinnarton, by whom he had the manor of Barrow; and had issue, John Savage son and heir; William, Arnold (who married Elen, dau. of William, son of sir Richard de la Lee, juxta Bacford, Knt.circ.1458) George, and Roger; also Margaret married John Dutton, second son of sir Piers Dutton of Dutton, 6 Hen.V. afterwards heir to sir Piers his father, lib.C fol. 160, w.x; Maude, married sir Thomas Booth of Barton in Lancashire.

He married Maude Swinnarton about the beginning of the reign of Henry the Fourth: for in anno 1409. 10 Hen.IV I find them married. Lib.D.pag 170,d. Whose Ancestor sir Roger Swinnerton was made a banneret by Edward the Third, to whom the king (in part of three hundred pounds worth of land for the supporting of the state of a banneret for his life) had given all the lands which belonged to Hugh le Dispenser earl of Winchester in the counties of Stafford and Chester; and after by his charter, dated at Nottingham, 16 Julii, 8 Edw.III 1334. Consideratione praemissorum ac obtentu laudabilis obsequii quod idem Rogerus nobis indies impendit, concedimus quod ipse habeat et retineat sibi et haeredibus suis, mannerium de Magna Barow in comitatu Cestria cum pertinentiis; ac omnes terras in villis de Rusthton Corneford, Austanfield, in comitatu Staffordiae; quae fuerunt praefati Hugonis le Dispenser. He gave also Little Barrow to him and his heirs, by another charter dated at Westminster, 25 Septembris, 8 Edw.III Lib.D. pag.169,B. And these were confirmed to Robert de Swynerton consanguineo et haeredi praedicti Rogeri, 13 Decembris, 2 Rich.II 1378. Which sir Robert Swynerton died 12 Edw.III after whose death Robert Swynerton, clerk, possessed the same as son and heir; which Robert died mense Junii, 23 Edw.III after whose death sir Thomas Swynerton, knight, as brother and heir of Robert possessed the same lands; which sir Thomas died mense Decembris, 35 Edw.III after whose death sir Robert Swynerton, his son and heir, enjoyed them and left them to this Maude his daughter and heir. Lib.D. pag.178,d.

(Sir John Savage survived Maud his first wife, and married, secondly, Elena, widow of James de Haryngton, 1428)

COUNTY OF SALOP

ABSTRACT OF THE QUARTER SESSIONS ROLLS 1820 - 1830

Jan.1830 pp.139-143

Charles Swinnerton of Soudley Constable, having a suspicion that John Gaytar, John Rycroft and Andrew Green, all of Soudley, navigators (navvies), were concerned in depredations in the neighbourhood, went to their houses about 11 pm and saw them go towards Cheswardine, the constable called upon Sam Pitchford, and they stationed themselves so that they could see the men return home, about 4 am Gaytor and Rycroft returned loaded with sticks and Green with a bag on his back which appeared to be a great weight, at 8 am the Constable with Joe Lee and Samuel Matthews went into the house and saw the three men, Adam Deavenhall the owner of the house and his wife take three ducks into a parlour, the oven appeared to have been recently heated, the constable pulled off the lid and saw two geese roasting in one dish, and a pie filled with goose and duck, on searching further he found a plate with a foot amongst the giblets; Hannah wife of John Anderson saw her husband's two geese and gander on Saturday night in a pot near the house, in the morning they were not to be found, later her neighbour Jackson told her two geese and some ducks were found at Soudley, she went to the Fox & Hounds Inn in Cheswardine, and was shown the foot which she knows by a mark to be the foot of one of her geese. John Rycroft says they went to see a young woman, and on the way back he picked up a few sticks to light a fire. John Gayter says Rycroft and Green caught the geese; Green says Gayter took a goose off him after he had caught it.

Last year our member **Jack Swinnerton** of Blackpool sent me a Merchant Seaman's Discharge Book belonging to the above and a programme of a Grand Variety Concert at the Theatre Royal, Hyde, for 19 April 1945 organised by "Mr.J.Swinnerton" to add to our collection of Swinnerton Memorabilia.

I put these on show with the other family bits and pieces at the Gathering last September and they aroused quite a lot of interest. Unfortunately, I had not got Mr.Swinnerton's notes with me but I now print this to explain their history.

"The articles enclosed belonged to my brother Joseph (JS.219) -he died in 1974, I thought that perhaps they may be of interest to the Society.

Joseph commenced work at Broadstone cotton mill at Reddish, Stockport. On the declaration of war in 1914 he immediately volunteered along with my brother, Walter Clifford. Joseph was placed in the Cheshire Regiment but was later invalided out and married Doris Marston - 2 years later Doris died in childbirth and a short while later the baby also died (Hilda Dora HS.57).

He then sold up his home and went to sea, during the years at sea he met and married Theodora Galman -a short while after this he left the sea and settled in London.

After a few years in London, he next came north as the Licensee of the Norfolk Arms Hotel in Hyde, Cheshire. During the years at Hyde he organised concerts for charity and raised quite a large sum of money to be distributed. He also was the Conservative candidate for the local council - unfortunately he was not elected. In his hotel he displayed two very large portraits - one of the Queen and one of Sir Winston Churchill - he never hid his views !

In the discharge book is listed a ship the 'Port Nicholson' - I was given to understand that it struck a rock off Las Palmas and sank. Fortunately, there were no casualties.

He used to talk a lot about the 'Mauretania' so I surmise that it was his favourite ship - he seemed rather upset when it was taken out of service.

After many years at Hyde he retired to Blackpool where, as I say, he died in 1974 "

" To your contributor J.W. in the May issue who asks about John Swinnerton Phillimore - he was my uncle.

He and his family spent their years between Glasgow, where he was Professor of Humanity at Glasgow University and Cam Cottage, Shedfield.

He, Belloc and G.K.Chesterton were together at Oxford and great friends. In Hampshire they explored the Roman Road which runs from Winchester to Wickham. He died in 1926 and is buried at Shedfield.

In a book of his poems "Things New and Old" published by Humphrey Milford in 1918, there is a section 'Sonnets of the Hampshire Roadside in Peace and War'. One is headed 'In Praise of Botley'.

"To Botley three good things belong; the tale
Of that poor churl who, from the parlour beam
Dangling, did sorely by mischance redeem
The sin of grudging pot-companions ale.
The next, Will Cobbett; though they clapt in jail
That Rural Rider, yet what freemen deem
Honest and true his yeoman style for theme
Referred; and Squire - cum - parson felt his flail.
But best of all, where beach and plan o'erarch
Inbrowning the Hamble stream below the mill
The pool that twice a day when tides convulse
The vasty seas, amare of the holy march
Of moon-led waters, all alert yet still.
Conspires remotely with Atlantic pulse. "

Having come across references to some Swinnertons in the records of the Grocers Company of London, I thought I would drop you a line to tell you of them in case they are unknown to you :

- 1599 **John Swannerton** freed (i.e. had undergone 7 years minimum as an apprentice to John Harvie, then Thomas Clifton)
- 1617 **John Swinnerton** freed (had been an apprentice to Lionel Haynes)
- 1623 (12 December) "**Thomas Swinarton** student and schollar of Corpus Christi Colledge in Oxforde beinge sonne of **John Swinarton** Grocer shall have one of the sayd exhibicons".
- 1632 (26 January) "**John Swynnarton**, Grocer, requested and was granted a benevolence on the occasion of the marriage of a daughter".
